



This course is an introduction to the Canadian law of torts. We will cover the

basic idea of a tort as a non-contractual civil wrong, and topics including nuisance, negligence, damages, defences, and vicarious liability. We will look at the role of tort law in modern Canadian society,

including in important political and moral questions such as environmental harm, the meaning of consent, and decolonization and

reconciliation with Indigenous peoples.
